Year 13 Overview

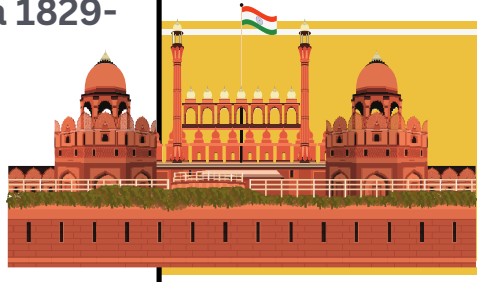

As well as looking at five case studies from across the Empire to explore how Britain went from losing her empire internally with the American Revolution to becoming the largest empire the world has ever known. Writing coursework to develop their skills in analysis and evaluation of interpretations of history in an independently chosen enquiry.

Year 12 Overview

Students will learn about dramatic political, economic, and social transformation of the USA in the 20th century, focusing both on domestic issues and involvement in international conflict. The study is over a wide time period and breaks down into five themes of study. They will also study in depth the transition of the Indian sub-continent from a colony to independence. Exploring the nature of Britain and India's relationship, the impact of the world wars, and rise of Indian nationalism.

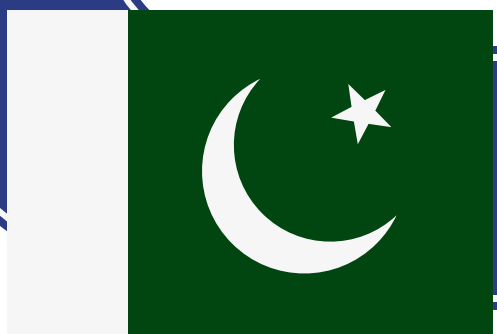

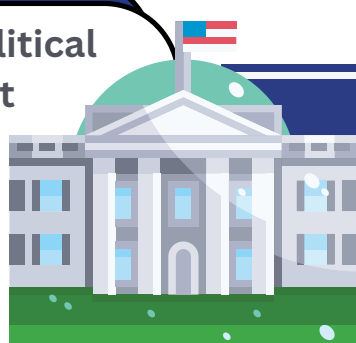

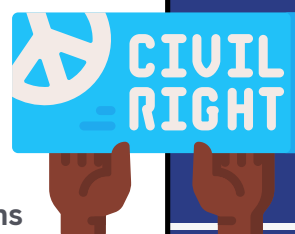
